INDUCTION/ORIENTATION PROGRAMME

What did this involve, how long did it last, was it useful?

I and the other international students arrived at UMass on Thursday August 29th and the rest of the students arrived that weekend or the following Monday and Tuesday. The orientation involved a few meetings, a disco/dance and raffle, a bowling trip and other trips throughout the first month of the semester like trips to Boston and skiing trips. During the first week there was also the opportunity to go to the nearby shopping mall and on hikes in the surrounding area.

ACADEMIC EXPERIENCE

Style of teaching, courses, ease of access to courses, methods of assessment, teaching support

The style of teaching is much more discussion based. Participation is very often a part of your grade which is great because everyone just loves hearing Brits talk. Signing up for courses is complicated because the online system doesn't recognise that international students do have the prerequisites required, but the staff in the International Programmes Office were helpful in enrolling me in my classes.

The method of assessment was mainly midterms which are often multiple choice tests. I also had a lot of weekly homeworks that counted towards my grade, which could include short online posts or analysing a case study and writing a summary every week. I have only had 2 final exams, one of which was a multiple choice test and the other we were given the exam a week before the test and then allowed to prepare before but not take any notes into the exam.

Teaching support was strong, all of my professors were very approachable and good at responding to emails, they also have weekly office hours and are usually available to make appointments outside of those hours if they don't work.

I moved out of Southwest after a week so that I didn't lose all the money I had paid for the accommodation into private off-campus housing. If I had stayed on campus I would have wanted to live in Central. Central seems to have nicer dorms, nicer, more relaxed people but there is a huge hill to get to it. I didn't really venture to any of the other dorms because they are really far away from everything, particularly the School of Management where all of my classes were.

Transport around campus is easy, there is a free bus system with your ucard (student id) and that takes you to nearby areas, around campus and the nearest shopping mall. Travelling is actually quite easy from UMass, there are 4 airports to choose from and transport back to UMass from those airports. Bradley International airport in Hartford, Connecticut, Boston Logan airport, and then Newark and JFK in New York. If you look around there are cheap flights to pretty much anywhere.

The Peter Pan Bus Company also has cheap buses to Boston, New York and many other places and leaves from the centre of campus so is really easy to use. I was lucky enough to go to Boston, New York, Chicago, Washington DC, New Hampshire and Florida while I was here.

Social life is difficult at first, especially because the International programmes office try to lump all the internationals together, who I didn't really have anything in common with, besides being from the same country, so I made an effort to get involved in other groups and to meet people in my classes, and I have met some amazing people, some of which I have stayed with over breaks and are already planning to visit me in London over the Christmas break this year!
